#### **UMCOR School Kits to VA Conference**

Many thanks to members of our congregation for their generous support of the **UMCOR School Kit** program. We were able to complete 100 kits which were boxed and delivered this year at the Virginia Annual Conference in Hampton on June 15. We are collecting items again through the month of September. The items included in the kits are collected in containers in the narthex of our sanctuary. Items can contain no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols. Only the following items can be placed in the kits:

- Blunt scissors (no plastic scissors)
- Single subject spiral notebooks, top bound white paper (8 ½ X 11), loose leaf paper (no more than 150 sheets per pack), NO hard back composition books.
- Hand held pencil sharpener (must be 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches long)
- Ruler, hard or flexible
- Unsharpened pencils (\*6 in each kit)
- 2 1/2" eraser
- 24 count box of crayons

Although, only the items listed above can be placed in the kits, any other school items collected will be donated to Westhaven School for use by their students.
