#### **Father Abraham**

Each Sunday we receive our morning offering to further God's Kingdom through Crossroads United Methodist Church. It is a time in our service when people from all walks of life can financially support the mission of the church.

We read in Genesis 12 about a man named Abraham. Father Abraham had many sons. And many sons had Father Abraham. Do you remember that song? Abraham at this time is 75 years old and has lived in a particular town all his life. He's got a nice life, nice family and he knows everyone in town. He's comfortable.

So, God comes to him and says, "Abraham, I want you to leave your hometown, and I want you to travel to this land that I'm going to show you." God didn't even reveal the end ---He just told Abraham to get moving. The Bible says that **THE NEXT DAY**, Abraham loaded up and moved. There is a principle in this story that we see all throughout the Bible.

The blessings of God always follow obedience. One more time......the blessings of God always follow obedience. In other words, we obey first, then we are blessed.

I know you're thinking..." If God would give me a raise, then I would be generous." But it doesn't work that way. I know you're probably thinking, "If God would give me some financial blessings, then I would obey the Bible." That's not how it happens.

We obey God even when it's tough, even when it's hard, even when it makes us uncomfortable. That's how Christianity and faith work.

Abraham went on to become the father of a great nation—the Jewish people. He was famous, blessed and important. God blessed him with a family. In fact, the Bible says that all the people on earth would be blessed through Abraham.

But none of that happened until after Abraham obeyed.

One of the big reasons we give is to obey God. We give generously because that's what the Bible teaches. Even if it makes us uncomfortable, we want to be obedient to God. The blessings of God will follow our obedience to God.

So, let's ask God to bless our offering each week and bless everyone who is obedient to His purposes.

Lewis said she is appreciative of all the prayers and gestures of care and concern she received from around the conference and United Methodist connection. She has steadily improved in her recovery and the time frame of her return is contingent on her continued healing and by advisement of her medical team.

Lewis also wanted to share her appreciation to Bishop Weaver for his calm and steady leadership in this interim period. She asks that the conference be in prayer and give thanks for the ways that Bishop Weaver has led and served this conference.

# Happenings at Annual Conference this Summer

The theme for the 2019 Virginia Annual Conference, held June 20-22, 2019 at the Berglund Center in Roanoke, Va., was "Moving Forward in God's Mission." The conference theme was based on Matthew 28: 18-20.

Voting for the 2020 General Conference delegation (11 clergy and 11 laity), Jurisdictional Conference (11 clergy and 11 laity) and alternates (10 clergy and 10 laity), started the Thursday, June 20 and concluded that night. Clergy and laity were split to conduct the voting.

Even though Bishop Sharma D. Lewis is currently on a six-month medical leave, Bishop Pete Weaver, interim bishop, kept Lewis' vision at the forefront of the conference. A clip of Lewis introducing her vision from 2017 was played during the opening session on Thursday. That vision is "Disciples of Jesus Christ who are lifelong learners who influence others to serve." All Virginia United Methodist churches will have a process of intentionally-forming disciples by 2020.

On Friday morning, six churches were discontinued in five districts. Two new faith communities and their pastors were introduced.

On Friday and Saturday, of nine submitted motions, six were discussed. Motions can be found at: www.vaumc.org/ncfilerepository/AC2019/AgendaMotions.pdf . Martha Stokes, 2019 General Conference delegation head, and the Rev. Tom Berlin, delegation clergy head, provided an overview of General Conference 2019 as well as the April 2019 Judicial Council decision on the afternoon of Friday, June 21. They also shared the items that will be before the 2020 delegation.

The "Glory Sightings" video series, which started in 2017, continued this year. These videos were shown throughout conference to highlight mission and ministry throughout the Virginia Conference. These videos can be accessed at: <u>https://vimeo.com/virginiaumc</u>.

A time of worship began on Friday at 11 a.m. with guest preacher Bishop Tracy S. Malone, resident bishop of the Ohio East Area. She based her message on Matthew 28, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations... and I will be with you to the ends of the age."

At the Friday afternoon retirement service, 60 pastors retired, with a combined total of 1,288.75 years of service. Our very own, Pastor Lynda Moore was acknowledged at the ceremony. The retirees were allowed one guest to sit on stage and walk with them during their ceremony and retirement dinner. Weeks prior to Annual Conference, my mother and I were very honored when Pastor Lynda asked us to be her guests, by my walking with her and my mother being her dinner guest.

The Rev. Seungsoo "RJ" Jun, pastor of Raleigh Court UMC, Roanoke District, preached for the Service of Remembrance in which 63 conference clergy and laity who died since the last Annual Conference were remembered.

A Service for the Ordering of Ministry Sixteen people were ordained elders, three were ordained deacons, 13 were commissioned as provisional members, one was recognized for orders, one associate member was recognized and 24 were licensed as local pastors in the Friday evening Ordering of Ministry service. Bishop Tracy S. Malone delivered the sermon preached on the topic of "From Start to Finish" based on Hebrews 11:29-12:3. Jesus finished the race set before him and now he is at the place of honor next to God.

To live out the vision of Bishop Sharma D. Lewis and support the Annual Conference theme, Moving Forward in God's Mission, clergy and laity participated in the 2019 Annual Conference 5K Walk, Run, Bike, and Yoga event on Saturday, June 22 at 6:15 a.m. Over 300 people registered for the event.

On Saturday morning, Mary Jane Rawley, Conference President of the United Methodist Women gave a brief presentation on the history of the organization in honor of their 150th birthday celebration on March 23<sup>rd.</sup> She asked for all UMW members to stand and be recognized.

Bishop Weaver based his sermon on Matthew 28 with a sermon titled "Go, Glow, Grow." We begin to glow "when we are willing to go and God is with us," he said. "So, fear not. Go with God. Christ will be with you."

This year's kit collection required the addition of a third tractor trailer due to the influx of kits. These kits will be distributed by United Methodist Committee on Relief. Annual Conference members brought 51,202 disaster relief kits to Annual Conference. Kits included: 36,296 Hygiene kits; 14,243 School kits and 663 Flood buckets.

Attendees of conference contributed almost 10,000 pounds of canned goods and boxed dry foods as part of the "4 Cans 4 Conference" drive.

Three new district superintendents were introduced at Annual Conference and the appointments for the 16 districts were approved.

It was my pleasure to represent Crossroads UMC by serving as your church delegate to the Virginia Annual Conference.
